Recent research by Kilty (2022) highlights the role of intersectionality in political participation, suggesting that the intersection of gender identity with other social categories, such as race, class, and ability, shapes individuals' experiences with political engagement. Non-binary and transgender individuals, especially those from marginalized communities, face compounded challenges in accessing political spaces, leading to their reduced visibility in political discourse.
