3. Data Interpretation:

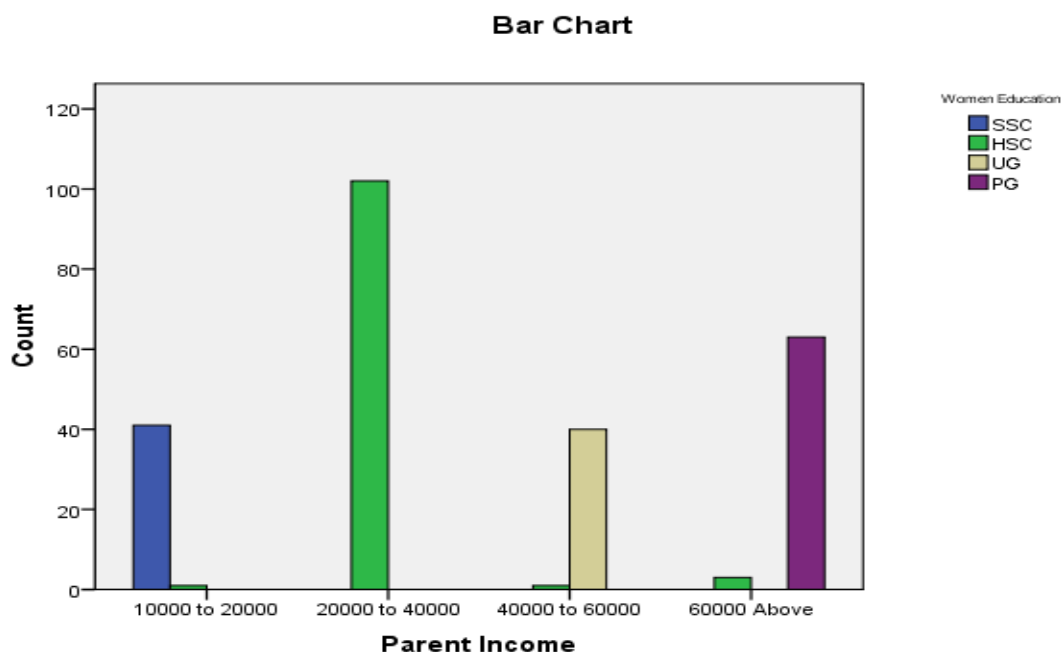
H1. There is an association between parent income and women education.
